Banned Books Assignment

After having had our class discussions, read an article, and watched videos about book banning you must write an approximately 300-word reflection answering the following questions (you are <u>not</u> required to answer *all* of these questions, go with what you are more interested in):

- Do you think there is merit in banning books? Why or why not?
- Who should decide what books kids get to read?
- Do you think banning books is harmful or beneficial? Why?
- How would you have felt if some of your favorite books were banned from you when you were younger?
- How would you feel if books were banned from your classroom or your school library because of the content?
- Do you think it's important for teenagers (and people in general) to feel represented in the books that they read?
- Thinking about which books are most often banned, do you think it can harm the authors of these books (and their representation?)
- What are the impacts of banning books?

*Remember to "back up" your arguments. Ask yourself: "Why am I saying this?" **Please look back at the articles we read (and the videos we watched if you need). Your reflection needs to have information to support it.
